Scholastic Art & Writing Awards regional








earned a silver medal in the prestigious Alpha Scholars program. Alpha Scholars is a rigorous social science research program that teaches college-level



research, writing, and presentation skills to high school students in support of the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDG). Students work one-on-one with Harvard student mentors in advanced study and research of a topic related to their chosen SDG.

Five seniors were named National Merit Commended Scholars in October. About 1.5 million high school students enter the program each year by taking the Preliminary SAT, and only the top 50.000 are named either a Commended Scholar or Semifinalist. and Life Sciences. The paper examined pyrethroid pesticides, commonly used to kill insects, and how they may affect brain development as shown by changes in gene activity in rats exposed to deltamethrin. The study highlighted potential risks to brain health and the need for more research on these pesticides.

Zeke Freeman '30

earned the highest rating possible at the Ohio Music Education Association Solo and Ensemble event. Judges awarded Zeke a Superior rating based upon



his cello playing—from memory!—of "Menuet No. 1" from J. S. Bach's First Cello Suite in G Major. It was his first experience at a live, adjudicated event.

Current Head of School Lynn Casto officially bestowed the title upon each of them, granting Ellie and Honor the full rights and privileges of the position. Throughout their respective days, each student embraced their leadership duties with enthusiasm—such as reading to young students, touring campus in a Gator, greeting families arriving in the morning, and enjoying special activities like declaring extra recess or Pajama Day for their classmates. The experiences were made possible by their parents, who won the opportunity at an MV Gala.

All eight MV musicians received Superior ratings—the highest possible—for their performances in February at the annual OMEA District One Solo & Ensemble event sponsored by the Ohio Music Education Association (OMEA). In January, five musicians performed beautifully at the OMEA District One Honors Orchestras and Band event. Participants were Sydney and Corinne (High School Honors Orchestra): flutist Ella Hu'27 (High School Honors Band); cellist Zeke Freeman '30 (chosen to be the associate principal cellist); and violist

Lucas Mabbitt '30 (Middle School Honors Orchestra).

The MV Hawks Robotics Team finished seventh out of 27 teams at the Denver BEST Robotics Regional Championship in December. The team finished second in the T-shirt design competition. The Hawks entered the competition seeded fifth, and then advanced into the semifinals. They made it to Denver by finishing third overall at a competition in Bowling Green, where they finished first in the Robot Performance Category. In Denver, Rami Ridi '25 was nominated by the team's coaches for the Kendrick Castillo Memorial Award. It recognizes students who mentor others, communicate well, volunteer in the community, and inspire others with respect and a positive attitude. It is named after Kendrick Castillo, a robotics enthusiast and high school senior killed in a 2019 shooting at his high school. The team was coached by Robert Daine and Phil Paskvan.

BUILDING ON YEARS OF PROGRESS MV introduces new diversity statement

The Maumee Valley Board of Trustees reaffirmed its commitment to diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging this year by introducing a new, forward-looking statement. Developed through months of collaboration between a board committee and school leadership, the updated statement reflects the school's ongoing diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging efforts, the progress made in recent years, and its aspirations for the future.

The process began in the fall when the Diversity Equity Inclusion Committee of the Board of Trustees—led by co-chairs **Tyler Boehm '05** and parent Nazarene Tubman P '22 '31—began reviewing the school's previous diversity statement, which was first adopted in 2015 and later revised in 2021. Their goal: craft a statement that more accurately represents MV's evolving commitment to creating an inclusive and empowering community.

Other participants were current board chair Andy Weiner P '25, '26 '28 and incoming board chair Alan Bannister P '26; parents Jennifer McCary P '30, '35 and Corrie Voss P '30; and MV leadership team members Lynn Casto (Head of School), Amy Yustick (Director of Strategy and Advancement), and Reanne Young (Director of Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging).

The newly adopted statement highlights the school's dedication to honoring individual experiences, fostering an inclusive culture, and embracing diverse perspectives as a pathway to educational excellence.

A Legacy of Action

At the heart of the school's commitment are students and their families. The ultimate goal is and has been to continue to build a school community that reflects all families. As a result, the new statement is the latest milestone in more than 10 years of dedicated diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging work at Maumee Valley. In 2015, the board launched the Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Cultural Competency Task Force, which included students, faculty, administrators, and board members, and laid the groundwork and strategy for the school's diversity growth. In 2017, MV used the NAIS AIM Tool (Assessment of Inclusion and Multiculturalism) to conduct its first cultural assessment.

As a result of that work and engaging with the consulting group Single Story, the Diversity Advocacy Team was created with the intention to organize community events, refine hiring and retention practices, and integrate diversity, equity, and inclusion principles into professional development and

curriculum development. These efforts were solidified in the 2021-2026 Strategic Plan, where diversity, equity inclusion, and belonging were identified as one of the school's four primary goals.

"At Maumee Valley, we believe that a truly exceptional education goes beyond academics. It nurtures a sense of belonging, respect, and empowerment for every member of our community," Casto said. "This new statement, along with our ongoing initiatives, reflects our deep commitment to fostering an environment where all voices are heard, all perspectives are valued, and every student can thrive as their authentic self. By continuously evolving and embracing diversity, we strengthen not only our school but also the world our students will help shape."

Diversity-related initiatives launched in 2024-2025:

- Quarterly Digital Publication: A platform for faculty and staff to share stories, highlight classroom experiences, and provide updates on professional development opportunities.
- Single Story Cultural Audit Review: A comprehensive evaluation of the school's values, beliefs, and practices through diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging lenses.
- Creation of the CARE (Cultural Assessment Restorative Equity) Team: A faculty, staff, and student-led group focused

on addressing challenges and opportunities identified in the cultural audit.

- Bias Incident Reporting Tool: A new online resource for faculty, staff, families, and students (grades 7-12), developed in response to student experiences at the national Student Diversity Leadership Conference in 2023.
- **Expansion of SEED (Seeking Educational Equity and Diversity) Training:** Extended to all faculty, staff, and now members of the Board of Trustees to deepen understanding of systemic inequities and inspire change.
- Neurodiversity Training for Faculty and Staff: Offered in partnership with the Hartmann-Eton Center for Teaching and Learning to enhance support for neurodiverse students.
- **Diversity Curricular Tool**: A curricular reflection tool designed by teachers Sara Card and Ana Rodriguez and former MV staffer Paula Apostolou to help teachers design their class units through the lenses of diversity, equity, and inclusion in mind.

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State Champ!

Michelle Li '25 leads Hawks to strong showing at Track & Field Championship

Michelle Li'25 led the charge at the Indoor High School State Championship meet in early March, claiming victory in the Division IV triple jump with an impressive leap of 34 feet 3.5 inches nearly three feet longer than the secondplace competitor. Sponsored by the Ohio Association of Track and Cross Country Coaches (OATCCC), the event featured the best athletes in the state, and Michelle had been ranked No. 1 at various points throughout the season.

"Before my jumps, I was a little nervous because I had the 4x200, but my coach told me to just stop thinking," Michelle said. "I kind of knew it was a good jump. I felt like I was flying, which was pretty cool. It was really rewarding."

Her victory propelled the Hawks to an 8th-place team finish, with several other impressive performances from her teammates:

- Girls' 4x200m Relay: 4th place (1:55.51)
 Michelle Li '25, Jasmyn Nupp '28, Jenna Ridi '28, Selena Young '27

Through the work of a task force composed of families, employees, and members of the Board of Trustees, the school decided this year to change that policy and charge admission for most of its athletic events for grades 7-12.

A major factor in the decision: the dramatic increase in officials' fees and operational costs for home games as well as costs associated with game-day management. All revenue from ticket sales is using to support MV athletes and sports programs.

Leadership Academy

Upper School students prepare to lead beyond MV

For decades, Maumee Valley Country Day School has fostered leadership among its students, helping them grow into thoughtful and capable individuals ready to make a difference. That commitment reached a new milestone with the creation of the Leadership Academy, a program officially launched in 2023 after years of development.

Designed for Upper School students, the Academy focuses on more than just preparing students to lead clubs or captain teams—it aims to equip them with the skills to lead entire organizations, both now and in the future.

The seeds of the Academy were planted back in 2016 during a Winter Intensive for Middle School students, co-taught by Athletic Director Rob Conover and former staff member Dr. Tara Morrin. That early version introduced 7th and 8th graders to leadership principles and encouraged them to imagine solutions for improving their school. It was intentionally student-driven, with participants shaping the mission and vision of the group.

As the years passed and the school's 2021–2026 Strategic Plan called for a deeper

investment in leadership development, the idea began to evolve. The plan

challenged the school community to inspire students to become agents of positive change by cultivating emotional intelligence, communication skills, and a strong sense of personal responsibility.

From that challenge came the fully realized Leadership Academy, first offered as a two-day summer program in 2023 and attended by 50 students. The following year, participation more than doubled. Now, the Academy is a requirement for any Upper School student interested in holding a leadership role whether in Student Government, athletics, or one of the school's 30-plus clubs.

But it's far from exclusive. Any student with a desire to grow as a leader is invited to participate.

For **Daivik Patel '25**, a three-sport athlete, class co-president, and head of the Indian Student Association, the Academy has become essential. "Leadership Academy has allowed me to better structure meetings, communicate effectively, and create a culture within my clubs," he said. "Over the year, my main focus has been instilling a culture of driven and motivated students throughout all the clubs and sports I am involved in. Leadership Academy has helped me achieve this vision by providing me with tools to engage club members and build community."

"Exploring one's capacity for leadership takes courage, persistence, and resilience," said Stephanie Harman P '22, head of Upper School. "I am so proud of our Leadership Academy cohorts. Not only do these students stretch themselves personally, but they also help us to grow this program to be the best it can be."

The Academy begins each year with a two-day summer workshop. Day one focuses on what co-founder Conover calls the "nuts and bolts of leadership" how to run meetings, set strategic goals, raise funds, and communicate effectively. On the second day, students shift their attention to the importance of organizational culture. They explore how groups form identities, how individuals' strengths and weaknesses influence outcomes, and how culture can fuel or hinder success.

One highlight of the second day is the "Raging River Challenge." In this team-building activity, students work together to cross the Johnson-Bayer "I learned that leading does not mean being the loudest voice in the room, but rather, the one that can help uplift others."

Gym floor using only wooden planks. Falling off means starting over, so success demands coordination, trust, and careful planning. The exercise is a vivid example of how collaboration and clear communication are at the heart of effective leadership.

Students also take the Myers-Briggs Type Indicator to better understand their personalities and how they interact with others. These self-assessments provide a foundation for learning how to manage diverse teams and navigate different communication styles—critical skills for any aspiring leader.

The Leadership Academy doesn't operate in isolation. Instead, it connects to leadership opportunities

throughout Maumee Valley, from the Kids Kouncil in Lower School to the Student Council in Middle School. The goal is a continuous journey in leadership development that begins as early as Kindergarten and culminates in Upper School with students leading meaningful change across campus.

Throughout the school year, Academy members keep the momentum going. The program doesn't have officers, but it is guided by the co-presidents of the Student Council—in 2024-2025, **Gloria Morales '25** and **May Drew '25**.

Gloria and May are not just organizers. They are also role models. Both came into the Leadership Academy with prior experience leading clubs and events, but they quickly discovered that even seasoned leaders have more to learn. For May, helping guide younger students through the Academy's workshops and activities became an unexpected mirror for her own growth.

"In the process of aiding other students to learn how to lead, I found myself experiencing just as much growth," she said. That growth included a shift in perspective: "I learned that leading does not mean being the loudest voice in the room, but rather, the one

that can help uplift others."

Gloria echoed that evolution. Despite already being an established leader at Maumee Valley, the Academy helped her explore new angles of leadership and gave her permission to lead in her own style. "I learned that there was no blueprint to be a leader," she said. Collaborating with May and their faculty mentors to co-facilitate the program only deepened that lesson. Now, she leads with more confidence and authenticity. "I no longer withhold my silly ideas during StuCo meetings," she said with a smile, and she plans to carry that mindset into college.

Academy members help organize events such as guest speaker sessions and networking lunches with community members. One standout initiative is the Leadership Summit, held in both 2024 and 2025, where local business and nonprofit leaders engaged in a speed-mentoring format, rotating among student tables to share career advice, leadership insights, and personal stories.

"The Leadership Summit aims to foster an environment of learning, mentorship, and collaboration," said Jana Smith, the Upper School dean of students and a co-advisor with Conover of the Academy. "Our students have the invaluable opportunity to interact with accomplished leaders from various

> fields, gaining insights into leadership styles, career paths, and

importance of community engagement."

These kinds of experiences—real world, interactive, and personal—are what make the Leadership Academy so impactful. Students leave with practical skills and a clearer sense of their own leadership identity.

Asa Karns '24, the school's all-time leading goal scorer in soccer and now a student-athlete at the University of Findlay, was part of the inaugural Academy cohort. He said it gave him the confidence to lead his team both on and off the field. "Leadership Academy did help me on my sports team, as it gave me eligibility to be a team captain, but it also made me comfortable to use my voice and have others look up to me," he said. "I could be an example for the younger guys and the other seniors."

Daivik Patel echoed that sentiment, noting how leadership played a key role in bringing his soccer team together and maximizing their potential. "From practices to games to even team dinners, leadership is key for any organization that is seeking to accomplish big things," he said. "With so much talent on the roster, it was of paramount importance to hold everyone together and lay out a clear framework of our goals as a team."

What began as a small pilot within a Middle School Intensive has now grown into a vibrant, campus-wide initiative that continues to evolve. For Conover, that growth is the point.

"We have great students and academic programs, and you need that," he said. "But the Academy helps with the other things—life skills, leadership, confidence. We're supplementing the really good academic experience they get here with tools that are just as essential. We want our kids to be leaders. We want them to change the world. And we hope the Leadership Academy gives them a head start as they move out from Maumee Valley."
